Our digital archive and book collection opened in May 2021 after a substantial renovation. The Library also houses a handpicked selection of more than 800 titles, ranging from books by friends and contemporaries of Seamus Heaney, to those authors the poet himself enjoyed reading.

The Library also boasts a Seamus Heaney digital archive, bringing together for the first time radio and television broadcasts presented by, or featuring the poet. Visitors can also access a selection of the online performances which HomePlace staged during the pandemic.



Explore locations linking the landscape and the literature of Seamus Heaney. Venture out to Open Ground, a series of five locations which held great significance for Seamus Heaney.

Discover the places that shaped his life and literature — Toomebridge, Magherafelt, Moyola River, Lough Beg and Bellaghy Bawn — and discover the smells, sights and sounds that make his poetry so uniquely of this place.

> Educating and Exploring

Our primary education programme uses Seamus Heaney's work as a catalyst for pupils to explore key 'World Around Us' topics, while enhancing and extending the Language and Literacy Curriculum. Pupils use poems such as 'Blackberry Picking', 'Churning Day' and 'A Kite for Aibhín' to examine cross-curricular themes in a fun and interactive manner.

At secondary level, we deliver programmes that are closely tied to both CCEA and WIEC examination objectives. Our

popular GCSE and AS Level lectures are presented by visiting professors, while pupils in Key Stages 3 and 5 also get the chance to work with PhD poetry students.

Schools undertaking Shared Education find Seamus Heaney HomePlace the perfect location to foster group work, as pupils come together in an environment which promotes imagination, participation and communication. Confluences and collaborations feature prominently as award winning poets Catherine Graham, Kate Newmann and Kathleen McCracken are joined by internationally acclaimed filmmaker and musician John T. Davis for an evening of poetry readings and original music hosted by poet Mel McMahon, author of the collections *Out of Breath* and *Beneath Our Feet*.

Catherine Graham is a Toronto-based writer, podcaster and creative writing instructor. The author of two novels and seven poetry collections, *Æther: An Out-of-Body Lyric*, was a finalist for the Trillium Book Award, Toronto Book Award, and won the Fred Kerner Book Award. Author of five collections of poetry, among them *The Blind Woman in the Blue* and *I am a Horse*, Kate Newmann has been the recipient of the James Prize, the Roundhouse Prize, the Allingham Prize and the Listowel Poetry Prize.

Kathleen McCracken is the author of eight collections of poetry including *Blue Light* and *College*, and has been a finalist for the Montreal International Prize for Poetry, the Walrus Poetry Prize, and the CBC Poetry Prize. In 2019, she won the Seamus Heaney Award for New Writing. John T. Davis is internationally recognized as one of Ireland's leading independent documentary filmmakers. Among his directorial credits are the award-winning cult classics *Shellshock Rock, Route 66* and *Hobo*. John is also an accomplished singer songwriter, and as well as performing a selection of his songs, John will accompany Kathleen's reading of her innovative new work *Mustangs*, or *The Ballad of Gideon Light*.

Seamus Heaney HomePlace is delighted to collaborate once again with Cinemagic to screen the beautiful family film *Wolfwalkers* as part of Cinemagic's 'Young Audiences Supporting Foodbanks' initiative.

In a time of superstition and magic, a young apprentice hunter, Robyn Goodfellowe, journeys to Ireland with her father to wipe out the last wolf pack. While exploring the forbidden lands outside the city walls, Robyn befriends a freespirited girl, Mebh, a member of a mysterious tribe rumoured to have the ability to transform into wolves by night. As they search for Mebh's missing mother, Robyn uncovers a secret that draws her further into the enchanted world of the Wolfwalkers and risks turning into the very thing her father is tasked to destroy.

Rather than paying for a regular ticket to gain entry to the film screening, audience members are asked to donate an essential item / food item on the day needed by the Foodbank to support the local community. KARL GEARY AND PAUL MURRAY In Conversation with Jan Carson

Karl Geary and Paul Murray are two of Ireland's brightest literary talents and both have published much-anticipated novels this year.

Karl Geary was born in Dublin and moved to New York at the age of 16. He co-founded two East Village institutions, the music venue Sin-e, and later the Scratcher. He has worked as a scriptwriter (*Coney Island Baby*) and an actor (Michael Almereyda's *Hamlet* and Ken Loach's *Jimmy's Hall*) and he recently adapted and directed Dorothy Parker's *You Were Perfectly Fine* for the screen. His widely acclaimed debut *Montpelier Parade* was shortlisted for the Costa First Novel Award and for Newcomer of the Year at the Irish Book Awards. His second novel *Juno Loves Legs* has just been published to great critical acclaim.

Paul Murray was born in 1975 and raised in south Dublin. He finished his first novel, *An Evening of Long Goodbyes*, while doing a creative writing MA at the University of East Anglia. He followed this with the blackly comic *Skippy Dies*, longlisted for the Booker Prize in 2010, and *The Mark and the Void* five years later. His latest novel, *The Bee Sting*, tracks the unravelling of a family in Ireland's Midlands.

Seán Keane from County Galway has been described as one of the greatest musical finds of the last few decades. Traditional Irish, folk and even country and blues songs all lend themselves to his unique style and unforgettable voice. Growing up among singers and musicians, Seán learned the sean nós style of singing in the heart of his family. His career began as part of Reel Union, a group that also featured his sister Dolores and accordion player Máirtín O'Connor. Later, he was part of Arcady, with such well-known names as Johnny 'Ringo' McDonagh, Sharon Shannon and Frances Black.

Since embarking on a solo career in 1993, all of his solo albums have been platinum sellers and he remains in constant demand. Today, Seán Keane continues to delight audiences all over the world with his live performances and innate vocal artistry. We are delighted to welcome him back to The Helicon following his previous sell-out performance in 2020.



JOHN SPILLANE

John Spillane is a musician, songwriter, performer, recording artist, storyteller, poet and dreamer. Rooted in people, place and story, his music transports the listener and his live performances captivate audiences around the world. As an artist, his music appeals to listeners across many genres and generations. His vocal style has a unique, almost seannós-like quality and his performances shimmer with the magic realism that permeates many of his songs as he effortlessly flits between beautiful poetry tinged with melancholy and roguish, irreverent humour. John has the ability to charm, mesmerise and entertain in equal measure.

A two-time Meteor Award winner for Best Folk/Trad act, John is one of the most accomplished songwriters in Ireland. With an extensive back catalogue beginning with the 1997 album *The Wells of the World*, his songs have been covered by Christy Moore, Sharon Shannon, Sean Keane and many others.

Twelve albums later, in April 2021, John released his first independent album in 20 years, *100 Snow White Horses* and in October 2022 he released *In Another Light*, a career-spanning album recorded live at the Right Here Right Now Festival at Cork Opera House in November 2021.

THE BALLAD OF PATRICK MACGILL: AN EVENING OF WORDS AND MUSIC

Born in 1890 on a poor farm in Glenties, Patrick MacGill was hired out to work at the age of 12. Despite years of hardship, this young Irish migrant worker managed to educate himself and become famous as 'The Navvy Poet'.

Belfast folk-singers Jane Cassidy and Maurice Leyden draw on Patrick MacGill's poetry and autobiographical novels, in which he brings to life the soul-destroying struggles of the migrant worker. MacGill's words are counter-pointed with folk songs from Ulster and Scotland on the themes of love, emigration, navvying and the lives of migrant workers. Maurice and Jane will be joined on stage by Scottish singer Derek Williamson who now lives in Donegal.

Together these talented performers bring to life the work of Patrick MacGill who was so inspired by place and what it means to call somewhere home.

Featuring Zoë Conway and John McIntyre



Bill Whelan has composed music extensively for theatre, film and orchestra. He won Best Musical Show album at the 1997 Grammy Awards for Riverdance. His music for film includes scores for *Dancing At Lughansa, Some Mother's Son* and *Lamb* with Liam Neeson.

His orchestral works include *The Seville Suite* – specially commissioned for Ireland's participation in Expo '92 –*The Spirit Of Mayo, The Connemara Suite* and *Linen & Lace* and as a studio producer he has worked with U2, Van Morrison and Kate Bush. Join us for an engaging evening of discussion and music as the man who put an indelible mark on Irish music and dance talks about his life with broadcaster John Toal.

To close the show Bill (piano) will be joined by well-known traditional Irish musicians Zoë Conway (fiddle, vocals) and John McIntyre (guitar), who so captivated the audience in The Helicon when they performed here last year.




AN AFTERNOON OF POETRY WITH FIONA BENSON, MARY JEAN CHAN & STEPHEN SEXTON

The prestigious Forward Prize for Poetry was won by Fiona Benson in 2020, for her second collection *Vertigo & Ghost*. Stephen Sexton also won in 2020 for *When All the World and Love Were Young* (Best First Collection) while Mary Jean Chan was shortlisted for the Forward Prize for Best Single Poem in 2017, becoming the youngest shortlistee in the history of the prize. Mary Jean's first collection, *Flèche* won the Costa Book Award for Poetry and their forthcoming collection *Bright Fear* has recently been shortlisted for the Forward Best Collection Prize. We are delighted to welcome them all to The Helicon to read from their award-winning work.

Fiona Benson was the recipient of an Eric Gregory Award in 2006 and her first collection, *Bright Travellers*, won the Seamus Heaney Prize. Stephen won an Eric Gregory Award in 2018. He lives in Belfast, where he teaches at the Seamus Heaney Centre at Queen's University. Mary Jean Chan was shortlisted for the International Dylan Thomas Prize, the Seamus Heaney Centre First Collection Poetry Prize and a Lambda Literary Award. A judge for the 2023 Booker Prize, Chan currently serves as a Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing (Poetry) at Oxford Brookes University.

Seamus Heaney HomePlace is honoured to welcome the Laureate for Irish Fiction, Colm Tóibín, who will present his second Annual Laureate Lecture in The Helicon.

The Laureate for Irish Fiction is an initiative of the Arts Council. The role seeks to acknowledge the contribution of fiction writers to Irish artistic and cultural life by honouring an established Irish writer of fiction, encouraging a new generation of writers, promoting Irish literature nationally and internationally and encouraging the pubic to engage with high-quality Irish fiction.

Colm Tóibín is the author of ten novels, including *The Magician*, winner of the Rathbones Folio Prize; *The Master*, winner of the Los Angeles Times Book Prize; Brooklyn, winner of the Costa Book Award; and *Nora Webster*, as well as two story collections, a poetry collection and several books of criticism. His plays include *The Testament of Mary*, nominated for a Tony Award for Best Play. In 1993 he was elected to Aosdána and in 2020 became a vice-president of the Royal Society of Literature. He is a member of both the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He has won the EM Forster Prize from the American Academy of Arts and Letter and the Kenyon Review Award for Literary Achievement, the Richard C Holbrooke Distinguished Award from the Dayton Literary Peace Prize and the David Cohen Prize. He was awarded the Bodley Medal in 2023 for his sustained contribution to the world of literature and his eleventh novel, *Long Island*, will be published in May 2024.


Brian Bilston has been described as the Banksy of poetry and Twitter's unofficial Poet Laureate. With over 200,000 followers on social media, Brian has become truly beloved by the online and the literary community.

His first collection of poetry, *You Took the Last Bus Home*, was published by Unbound. *Diary of a Somebody* (Picador) was shortlisted for the Costa First Novel Award and the McKitterick Prize. *Alexa, What Is There To Know About Love?*, his last collection, was described by one reviewer as 'the funniest collection of humorous verse I have seen in a long time'. His poem 'Refugees' was set to music by Mark-Anthony Turnage for his 2019 song cycle of the same name, and *Fifty Ways to Score a Goal*, a collection of poems about football for children, was published in 2021.

Days Like These: An Alternative Guide to the Year in 366 Poems is his latest book and is out now in hardback, a brilliant collection of poems that will take the blues out of Monday, flatten the Wednesday hump and amplify that Friday feeling, from January through to December.

THE LETTERS OF SEAMUS HEANEY: CHRISTOPHER REID IN CONVERSATION

To coincide with the publication of *The Letters of Seamus Heaney* by Faber & Faber, HomePlace is delighted to welcome the collection's editor, poet Christopher Reid. For all his public eminence, Seamus Heaney seems never to have lost the compelling need to write personal letters. In this ample but discriminating selection from 50 years of his correspondence, we are given access as never before to the life and poetic development of a literary titan – from his early days in Belfast, through his decision to settle in the Republic, to the gradual broadening of horizons that culminated in the award of a Nobel Prize and the years of international acclaim that kept him heroically busy until his death.

Editor Christopher Reid draws from both public and private archives to reveal this story in the poet's own words. Generous, funny, exuberant, confiding, irreverent, empathetic and deeply thoughtful, the letters encompass decades-long relationships with friends and colleagues, as well as showing an unstinted responsiveness to passing acquaintances. Moreover, Heaney's joyous mastery of language is as evident here as it is in any of his writing for a literary readership.

Christopher Reid will be in conversation about the process of collating this edition and the evening will feature dramatic readings from a selection of the letters.



MARY ROBINSON In Conversation with Mark Carruthers

Seamus Heaney HomePlace is delighted to welcome former Irish President Mary Robinson to The Helicon to discuss her distinguished career, her humanitarian work and her writing.

Mary Robinson is Adjunct Professor for Climate Justice in Trinity College Dublin and Chair of The Elders. She served as President of Ireland from 1990 to 1997 and UN High Commissioner for Human Rights from 1997 to 2002. She is a member of the Club of Madrid and the recipient of numerous honours and awards including the Presidential Medal of Freedom from the President of the United States Barack Obama. Between 2013 and 2016 Mary served as the UN Secretary General's Special Envoy in three roles and her Foundation, the Mary Robinson Foundation – Climate Justice, established in 2010, came to a planned end in April 2019.

Mary Robinson currently serves as Patron of the International Science Council and Patron of the Board of the Institute of Human Rights and Business. Recently she became joint Honorary President of the Africa Europe Foundation.

Mary's memoir, *Everybody Matters* was published in September 2012 and her book, *Climate Justice - Hope, Resilience and the Fight for a Sustainable Future* was published in September 2018. A visionary leader and inspiring humanitarian, Mary Robinson will be in conversation with journalist and presenter Mark Carruthers.



ECOPOETICS With Kate Simpson, Emma Must and Linda France

What role can, and should, poetry play in the climate crisis? Is reading and writing poetry an inherently ecological act and if so how do we define 'ecopoetry'? Join Editor Kate Simpson and poets Linda France and Emma Must as they discuss the poetics of climate – charting deep geologic time through to current anthropocentric behaviours whilst utilising language as a witness to our time on Earth. In this discussion and reading, we speak to, and of, the human and more-than-human, exploring words and worlds in tandem.

Out of Time: Poetry from the Climate Emergency, edited by Kate Simpson was selected as a Guardian Book of the Year and was awarded a Poetry Book Society Special Commendation, lauded as the 'definitive anthology for this decisive decade.' Published in tandem with Friends of the Earth's 50th anniversary, *Out of Time* includes poems from Caroline Bird, Mary Jean Chan, Seán Hewitt, Raymond Antrobus, Linda France and Emma Must, amongst others.

Linda France's latest collection *Startling*, is the tenth collection from Laurel Prizewinning poet and comprises poems written from, and into, the fabric of the sixth mass extinction, practising a concept of 'radical kindness.

Emma Must's *The Ballad of Yellow Wednesday* commemorates 30 years since the Twyford Down protests against major road-building in the 1990s. This collection includes powerful, moving and honest depictions of the campaign, in which Emma played an integral role.

Recent years have seen Brigid O'Neill gaining a deserved reputation as one of Ireland's finest songwriters.
